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History/ Geography	Geography - Children will learn how to recognise the canal – human feature- on an aerial photograph. They will discuss how to recognise the Clough – a natural feature - on a map of the local area. Children will learn how to use directional language to describe the route from school to the canal on a map of the local area. They will learn how to use simple compass directions to describe the location of features in the local area, including the canal and Boarshaw clough. Pupils will discuss why canals were built many years ago and how to stay safe near the canal. Children will work on how to collect information to find out how people enjoy the canal today. They will talk about and learn how to look after the local environment and encourage others to do the same.	Geography - Children will learn that North America and South America are continents, which they can find in an atlas and locate on a World Map. History - Children will learn about Christopher Columbus and understand he was a famous explorer who lived over 500 years ago. Children will recognise that Columbus discovered new lands – the Americas and brought back goods such as pineapples and turkeys.	History - Children will learn that Ernest Shackleton was a famous explorer. They will understand that Shackleton went on several trips to explore the South Pole on the continent of Antarctica. Children will recall that his most famous journey was on a ship called Endurance. They will know that Shackleton rescued his crew when they became trapped in ice. Geography - Children will know that Antarctica is surrounded by the Southern Ocean that can be located on a world map and a globe. Children will be able to name some animals found in cold places and understand that the equator is an imaginary line around the middle of the earth. Children will know that countries near to the equator are hot countries and that countries furthest away from the equator are cold countries (the poles).	Geography - Children will know the names of the four countries of the UK and the names of the capital cities. History - They will understand that the Diary of Samuel Pepys is evidence of the Great Fire of London. They will recall that The Great Fire of London started in a bakery on Pudding Lane because the fires were not put out properly and discuss why the fire spread so quickly. Children will learn that in 1666, the buildings in London were made from wood and straw and they were very close together, making it easy for flames to spread. They will know that strong winds were blowing, which helped the flames to spread. Children will discuss the fact that the king made a new law after the fire that buildings had to be made from brick or stone. They will know to recognise photos of London, now and before the Great Fire.	Geography - Children will know that the UK is surrounded by North Sea, The English Channel and the Irish Sea and that these can be found on a map. They will know how to locate the city of Manchester on a map of England. Children will know the names of at least 4 human features of Manchester and recognise the similarities and differences between Middleton- a town- and Manchester – a city. Children will discover that Edinburgh Castle is a famous landmark in the city of Edinburgh and Ben Nevis, that Cardiff Castle is a famous landmark in the city of Cardiff and that Belfast City Hall is a famous landmark in the city of Belfast.	Children will focus on Fire Fighters and know that they work to keep us safe. They will know that men and women can be firefighters and that firefighters are brave. Children will understand that firefighters work as a team, helping each other. They will know that firefighters drive fire engines and wear special clothes to keep them safe. Children will discuss how firefighters need to be fit to climb ladders and carry people.	Geography - Children will know that Australia is one of the 7 continents which can be found on a globe. Children will be able to name at least 2 different animals that are native to Australia. They will understand that some Aboriginal peoples live in the Outback regions. They will know that the capital city of Australia is Canberra and recognise some similarities and difference between the capital city, London, and the capital city, Canberra.	Geography - Children will know that Australia is surrounded by the Southern Ocean, the Indian Ocean and the Pacific Ocean. They will learn that countries near to the equator are hot countries. Children will focus on The Great Barrier Reef and understand that it can be found in the Pacific Ocean off the coast of Australia. Children will discuss global warming and rising sea temperatures and how this is harming the coral. Children will discuss what we can do to help stop global warming.
