The referee's whistle could be heard.	The whistle belongs to the referee.

An apostrophe is used to make the contracted form.

fast + er	faster – She was much faster than him.
fast + est	fastest – He was the fastest runner.
safe + ly	safely – She crossed the road safely.
small + er	smaller – I am smaller than my dad.
hope + ful	I am hopeful that it will be a sunny day today.

The prefix un (at the start of a word) can change the word to mean the opposite.
