#### I know:

### Things I will remember

- To use collage technique by layering, folding, crumpling and tearing materials
- To independently select appropriately coloured paper and materials to use in my collage designs-hot colours, e.g. red, orange,
- To arrange materials to try out different ideas creating texture through layering, before sticking them onto a surface
- To experiment with tones, blending chalk to represent the Great Fire
- To consider line and perspective when sketching buildings

### Key Vocabulary

**chalk** Chalk is a natural stone or earth substance that comes in a variety of colours

**blending** Smoothly merging two or more colours, tones, or textures to create a seamless transition

**silhouette** The dark shape and outline of someone or something visible in restricted light against a brighter background

**collage** An art form that is made up of overlapping pieces of material, such as photographs, fabric, coloured and textured paper and other types of mixed media

**sketching** A rough drawing or painting in which an artist notes down their preliminary ideas for work
