

Story Themes: Friendship, Adventure and Imagination

Setting Description: The Audience – Peers The Tone – Intrigue, danger and Excitement

Strings of ivy and the creeper called Old Man's Beard hung in the air. Far below was the bottom of the pit. The dump.

Character Description: The Audience – Peers The Tone – Intrigue

There was somebody there! Or Something! Something, or Somebody, had a lot of shaggy black hair and two bright black eyes that were looking very hard at Barney. 'I fell down the cliff,' said Barney. Somebody grunted. 'My name's Barney.' Somebody- Something made a noise that sounded like 'Stig'. It got up and moved towards Barney into the light. Barney was glad to see it was Somebody after all. Funny way to dress though, he thought, rabbit- skins round the middle and no shoes or socks.

Setting Description: The Audience – Peers The Tone – Intrigue, exploration,

It was a cave dug into the chalk. There was a cool, damp smell. There were stones and bones, fossils and bottles, skins and tins, stacks of sticks and hanks of string. There were motor car tyres and hats from old scarecrows, nuts and bolts and bobbles from brass bedsteads. Use of Senses
What can we See?
Hear?
Touch?
How do we feel?

Figurative Language
Personification:
'The Dump seemed to whisper secrets.'
Imagery: 'The bright colours of the broken toys sparkled in the sunlight.'

Element of danger: 'flints poking out like bones in places'-Would Barney suffer broken bones if he fell over the edge?
'Crumbly'-Could the ground give way at any minute?
'holding on desperately' – Could it fall at any second?
Over the edge-why is this repeated twice? Would Barney go over the edge?

Text analysis: Some Features of a Character Description

Creating a sense of intrigue:

Appearance – 'somebody with a lot of shaggy hair and two bright black eyes'. Stig is wearing a rabbit skin. 'Hairy hands'.

How the character speaks – 'Somebody grunted'.

How the character moves – 'squatted down' 'sporang up'

The character's actions – 'sharpening a stone'
Verbs: squatted sprang thump and point grunt

Text analysis: Some Features of the Setting Description

Creating a sense of intrigue, curiosity, discovery
Imagery
'cool, damp smell'
'As it flared up'
Where the water dripped through a crack in the roof..."
Engages the reader's senses, making them feel as if they are in the cave, the sights, the sounds.

'stones and bones, fossils and bottles, skins and tins..."
The list conveys abundance and variety. Enhances the sense of discovery and richness of the cave's contents.
