Lesson Three and Four

LI: To make links between the Scripture sources (e.g. Matthew 28: 16-20) and what happens at mass.

LI: To make connections with life of the early Church and Catholic gathering for mass today.

Matthew 28: 1-10 - Jesus is alive and has sent a message for his disciples to meet him in Galilee.

Matthew 28: 16-20

Jesus says to baptise people in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Activities:

Using a copy of **Matthew 28: 16-20** in their books, pupils annotate

- characters
- places
- highlight dialogue

Discuss vocabulary for example, why might some of the disciples doubted? Encourage pupils to focus on the dialogue highlighted. What words / phrases do they recognise? What do Jesus’ words mean?

Using **Matthew 28: 18-20** Pupils to explain What it meant for the disciples at the time. What meaning Matthew wanted for his audience. What it means for us.

Lesson Five and Six

LI: To use religious language to describe the Christian belief in the mystery of God as Trinity and describe some signs and symbols of the Holy Trinity.

LI: To know some of the prayers of the Catholic Church which express belief in the Trinity and the Holy Spirit, e.g., Glory Be, Come Holy Spirit.

LI: To explore the different ways the Holy Spirit is expressed in stories from the Bible.

LI: To look at and discuss the ways the Holy Spirit is described in art.

**Matthew 28:16 – 20.** Why do you think Jesus instructed the disciples to ‘make all peoples His disciples: baptise them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit’?

The Holy Trinity is three persons in one God and that they were filled with a great love that they wanted to share.

There are three persons in one God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This links with the earlier work on the **Sign of the Cross.**

**The Father** created a beautiful world for us to care for (link with stewards of creation) and enjoy.

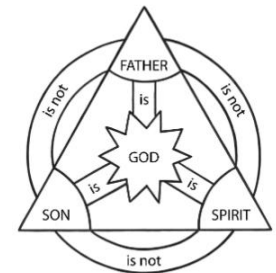
**The Son**, Jesus, loved us so much that He came down to earth to show us what God is like, sharing his life with us.

**The Holy Spirit** lives in our hearts (the spirit of God) guiding us to make the right choices.

**The Sign of the cross is a prayer. What do you think?**

Children to discuss the question, thinking about why baptism and why the sign of the cross is used. Also, when do we make the sign of the cross – list the times...

Start and end of prayers, baptism, entering Church, some pupils may share footballers etc who make the sign of the cross before a match.

Lesson Seven and Eight

LI: To retell with increasing detail the account of the Ascension.  
LI: To ask and respond to questions about how the disciples felt after the Ascension and before Pentecost, noticing the role of Mary.  
LI To know that Mary joins the disciples in prayer as they wait for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

Lesson Nine

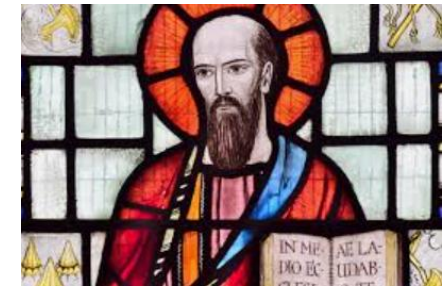
LI: To retell with increasing detail the account of the Pentecost.  
LI: To listen to and ask questions about how other experience and celebrate Pentecost in different cultures.  
LI: To know that the mission of the Church begins at Pentecost.  
LI: To know that just as the early Church gathered to pray, Catholics gather together at Mass today.

Lesson Ten

LI: To make connections between the mission of the Church and the mission of Jesus.  
Jesus' mission is explained in Luke 4: 16-19 "The Spirit of God is upon me because he has anointed me to proclaim the Good News to the poor."  
LI: To recall the life of Jesus in the Gospels we have studied to see how well he lived out his mission on earth.  
LI: To explore the work of the Disciples in Acts.  
To explore Paul's letters to the early Christians (Cor 11:23-27).  
LI: To write a letter to explain our mission as Christians, disciples of Christ, on Earth.
