Homophones are words that have the same pronunciation but mean different things

Using a dictionary. A dictionary can be used to find the meaning of a word and for checking the spelling of a word. Dictionaries can also give other information about words such as word type and origin.

Find the first letter of the word and then find the correct page in the dictionary. Then look at the second (and third) letter of the word and scan down the list of words until you find the correct one.



The difference between vocabulary typical of **informal speech** and vocabulary appropriate for **formal speech** and writing (for example, *find out* – *discover*; *ask for* – *request*; *go in* – *enter*).

How words are related by meaning as **synonyms** and **antonyms** (for example, *big*, *large*, *little*).

How **hyphens** can be used to avoid ambiguity [for example, *man eating shark* versus *man-eating shark*, or *recover* versus *re-cover*]

Relative clauses - *who*, *which*, *where*, *when*, *whose*, *that*, or an omitted relative pronoun.

Use of the **semi-colon** to mark the boundary between independent clauses (for example, *It's raining; I'm fed up*)

Use of the colon to introduce a list and use of semi-colons within lists: Use a colon to introduce an item or list, if the list comes after a complete sentence or independent clause. This year I want to visit four amazing cities: Paris, London, New York, and Barcelona.

Punctuation of **bullet points** to list information.

Here's how to give your dog a bath:

- Place a shower cap on your dog's head.
- Give him his rubber ducky to provide emotional security.
- Gently bathe your dog. Avoid getting water in his big sad eyes.
