

Some adjectives change the spelling to match the noun

- La cuisine est petite.
- La chambre est moderne.
- Le salon est beau.
- Le lit est comfortable.

Grammar

Key Vocabulary

- In French, when we use 'la' or 'le', we're referring to something specific.
- For example, 'la cuisine' means 'the kitchen' (we know *exactly* which one we're talking about).
- When we want to talk about something nonspecific, we use 'une' or 'un'. For instance, 'une cuisine' means 'a kitchen' (it could be *any* kitchen).
- To switch between 'une/un' and 'le/la', follow this rule:
- Change 'une' to 'la'.
- Change 'un' to 'le'.
