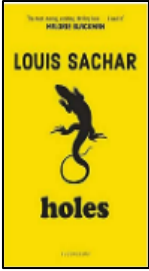

Holes won the 1998 U.S. National Book Award for Young People's Literature and the 1999 Newbery Medal for the years "most distinguished contribution to American literature for children". Plot: Stanley Yelnats is under a curse. A curse that begins with his no-good-dirty-rotten-pig-stealing great-great-grandfather. Now Stanley has been unjustly sent to a juvenile detention centre, Camp Green Lake, where the boys build character by spending all day, every day digging holes exactly five feet wide and five feet deep.
